The National Health Service (Free Prescriptions and Charges for Drugs and Appliances) (Scotland) Regulations 2011

Summary

1. This circular advises NHS Boards of :
 - the abolition of prescription charges in Scotland;
 - the charging arrangements for other UK prescriptions;
 - amendments to prescription stationery;
 - processing electronic scripts; and
 - guidance for community pharmacists in relation to the Minor Ailment Service.
2. Charging and exemption arrangements are detailed in **Annex A**. Prescription stationery processing arrangements and an example of the revised form are detailed in **Annex B**. Guidance in relation to the Minor Ailment Service (MAS) is included in **Annex C**.
3. A Q&A document is being issued to all Community Pharmacies, Dispensing Doctor Practices and GP Surgeries providing answers to questions which may be asked by patients and others.
4. NHS Boards are asked to note the content of this circular and bring to the attention of all relevant staff. This should include all those involved in dealing with matters relating to prescription charges and prescription stationery.

NHS Prescription Charging Arrangements in Scotland

Regulations have been approved by the Scottish Parliament to abolish NHS prescription charges in Scotland. From the 1 April 2011 Scottish NHS prescription forms presented for dispensing in Scotland will not attract a charge.

Prescription forms from Wales and Northern Ireland will be dispensed free of charge under current arrangements when presented for dispensing in Scotland.

Prescription forms from England will be charged from the 1 April 2011 at the new English rate of £7.40. The exception being if the patient is exempt from paying charges as listed in Regulation 4 of the National Health Service (Free Prescriptions and Charges for Drugs and Appliances) (Scotland) Regulations 2011 or the prescription form is accompanied by a valid entitlement card (see below.).

NHS Charging Arrangements for Overseas Visitors in Scotland

It is for healthcare providers to determine an overseas visitors need and eligibility to access NHS healthcare or services as detailed in CEL 9 (2010).

Where a person is deemed eligible to access services and is provided with a Scottish prescription form they will be entitled to have the prescription dispensed free of charge if presented in a pharmacy in Scotland in the same way as a person ordinarily resident in Scotland.

NHS Prescription Charging Arrangements elsewhere in the UK.

Any Scottish prescription form presented for dispensing in England will be charged at the English rate, £7.40 per item, unless the patient qualifies for exemption or the item(s) is exempt from charge.

Any Scottish prescription form presented for dispensing in Wales or Northern Ireland will be charged at the rate in force at the time. This is currently £0.00.

Entitlement Cards

Patients resident in Scotland and registered with a GP Practice in England will only benefit from the abolition of charges if they hold a valid entitlement card and present their prescription for dispensing at a pharmacy in Scotland. For an entitlement card to be valid, the patient's details and address on the entitlement card **must** match the information on the prescription form.

Exemption Certificates

Medical - The current list of medical exemptions will remain and patients suffering from any of the listed conditions will continue to be eligible to apply for a medical exemption certificate. GPs should continue to verify the patient's eligibility for the appropriate medical exemption as certificates will be required to verify a patient's entitlement to register for the Minor Ailment Service (MAS) and for entitlement to exemption if a prescription is dispensed in England.

Maternity - GPs should also continue to verify the patient's eligibility for maternity exemption as certificates will be required to verify a patient's entitlement to register for MAS and for entitlement to exemption if a prescription is dispensed in England. The Maternity Exemption Certificate also enables an expectant/nursing mother to access free NHS dental treatment.

Prescription Prepayment Certificates (PPCs)

Prescription Prepayment Certificates are no longer available for sale in Scotland. Community Pharmacists and Dispensing Doctors should return any unsold PPCs to the address below by 30 June 2011 for a refund.

The current Version 5 prescription stationery will remain in circulation. However amendments are being made to the wording of the patient declaration on the top of the form. The revised stationery will be phased in as current stocks are used up. A new version is **NOT** being introduced.

From now on **Part B** on the reverse of the prescription form should be signed as confirmation that the prescription item(s) have been dispensed. For information on the eligibility of overseas visitors to receive NHS services, including NHS prescriptions, see the relevant paragraph in Annex A above. Patients are no longer required to mark an exemption category on an NHS prescription form unless they present their prescription in England and qualify for exemption.

Processing Prescription Forms - Electronic Exemption Status

From 1 April 2011 patients will sign the declaration in Section B on the reverse side of a paper prescription form and will not be required to annotate an exemption status. The ePharmacy Programme will be working with Patient Medication Record (PMR) system suppliers to update the IT functionality to support the abolition of prescription charges in Scotland as currently electronic claim messages **must** include a non-exempt or exemption status.

In the meantime, community pharmacy PMR systems will continue to apply the exemption statuses currently recorded in the patient PMR record in the electronic claim message or they will prompt for the recording of an exemption status where one is not currently recorded for the patient. The following guidance describes how community pharmacists should approach these two scenarios until such time as PMR systems have been updated.

- A patient **HAS** an exemption status or non-exempt status recorded:

No additional action is required to the existing process. The exemption status recorded will be populated in any electronic claim messages and you may be asked to confirm the patient details. Patients who were previously not exempt from prescription charges should continue to be recorded as non-exempt. Patients who have outstanding prescription pre-payment certificates should also continue to be recorded as having a pre-payment certificate although pharmacists may wish to remove the expiry date as that will no longer be valid. This will cover the significant majority of patient PMR records as they will have the patient exemption status already recorded.

- A patient **DOES NOT** have an exemption status or non-exempt status recorded:

When a new patient presents, or for whatever reason a patient record does not have an exemption status recorded, an exemption status must be set in the PMR to enable electronic claims to be sent.

Both of the above scenarios will be supported by the automatic setting of age exemption status based on a patient's date of birth.

Community pharmacists may wish to reduce the prescription levy held on their PMR systems from £3.00 to £0.00. PSD have put in place new working processes where the exemption status will not be used in the payment processing for Scottish prescription forms.

Further guidance on PMR enhancements to support the abolition of prescription charges will follow in due course.

Minor Ailment Service (MAS)

Circular PCA (P) (2011) (6) provides an updated set of Directions and service specification for the Minor Ailment Service (MAS). In essence, there is no change to MAS as a result of the abolition of prescription charges. The same groups of patients who were eligible to register and use MAS prior to the abolition of prescription charges will continue to be eligible. Further information is available in the circular.

Whilst patients are no longer required to mark an exemption category on an NHS prescription form unless they are presenting it in England and qualify for exemption they **will** require to mark an exemption category on a CP2 form if they are registering or receiving care under MAS. GPs have been advised to continue to issue medical and maternity exemption certificates in order to assist community pharmacists in verifying a patient's entitlement to register for and use MAS.

In relation to Annex B of this Circular:

- where a patient previously has an exemption status recorded in their Patient Medication Record (PMR) it will be used to enable MAS registrations, including eligibility checks; and
- where there is no exemption status recorded in the PMR the addition of an exemption status that qualifies a patient to register for MAS or a non-exempt status during the dispensing of NHS prescriptions, will enable the pharmacist to benefit from the MAS eligibility checking built into PMR systems. If a patient is recorded as non-exempt and later wants to register for MAS and is eligible to do so their exemption status can be updated once eligibility has been ascertained and the registration can then proceed.
